## New Forest Transect Group Newsletter 2018

Numbers continue to fall dramatically, with only 1,694 butterflies seen (excluding the exploratory Roe Transects), less than half the Week 17 total. Only three routes had higher counts than last week, with many others well down.

Grayling are doing very well, but Gatekeeper numbers have plummeted. There are a lot of Common Blue around and the second brood of Holly Blue are also showing well.

Twenty-six different species were seen overall this week: Gatekeeper (387), Meadow Brown (348), Speckled Wood (251), Small White (213), Common Blue (123), Large White (77), Brimstone (55), Holly Blue (41), Grayling (40), Green-veined White (38), Silver-washed Fritillary (30), Comma (18), Small Heath (13), Small Copper (11), Brown Argus (11), Ringlet (10), Silver-studded Blue (8), Red Admiral (6),

Small/Essex Skipper (4, of which 1 was identified as Small Skipper), Marbled White (3), Large Skipper (2), Clouded Yellow (1), Painted Lady (1), Small Tortoiseshell (1), Peacock (1) & Dark Green Fritillary (1).

Silver-studded Blue, Ringlet, Marbled White & 'Golden Skippers' are now at very low numbers and not expected to be around this coming week.

**Moth to Spot**: This week's focus is on the Jersey Tiger (<u>https://www.ukmoths.org.uk/species/euplagia-quadripunctaria/</u>) - one of the larger day flying moth with a very striking appearance. Almost triangular in shape when at rest, this moth has eye catching striped black and white forewings, with a reddish orange underwing with

black spots. Originally seen only in the Channel Isles and occasionally along the south coast, in recent years it seems to be expanding its range. It is still most likely to be seen in the Avon Valley and along the south coast, but has already been

reported further inland this year so keep eyes skimmed both on and off transect!
