A very strange week! Forget the butterflies for the moment: *Ephialtes manifestator* (a solitary wasp which is a parasitoid on other invertebrates) recorded at Fields Heath, a Pine Marten at Acres Down and a nude photo shoot at Ibsley - who said butterfly recording wasn't interesting?

Total butterflies for Week 23 (excluding the exploratory Roe Transects) was 599 (772 in Week 22), which is 7.52 butterflies/km, a little lower than last year's density for Week 23 (9.22/km).

Speckled Wood have dominated once again, but with far fewer around than last week (294/415). Small White have held their own and the multi-voltine (brooded) Small Hath & Small Copper have done well this week. All of the Brown Argus seen were recorded at Mockbeggar.

There was a surge in species diversity this week, up four from last week to eighteen:

Speckled Wood (294), Small White (88), Large White (42), Small Copper (40), Common Blue (31), Small Heath (30), Meadow Brown (24), Holly Blue (15), Brown Argus (7), Comma (6), Brimstone (5), Green-veined White (4), Small Tortoiseshell (3), Peacock (3), Grayling (3), Gatekeeper (2), Clouded Yellow (1) and Red Admiral (1).

Moth to Spot: Although it's getting late in the season, there are still a number of moths you may see flying, in particular those that have a second generation. One of these is the Blood-vein (https://ukmoths.org.uk/species/

timandra-comae/adult-2/), a light coloured moth with a distinctive red to brownish line running between the wing tips when it is at rest and a pinky fringe to its wings. It's mainly likely to be seen in damper grassy areas, including woodland rides and hedgerows.
