A very varied week with many routes returning low counts, but Breamore certainly did well, as did Kings Copse. The average was slightly under 4 butterflies/km, compared to 5.33 in 2017, but 2016 was even less at 2.08 butterflies/km. The total count (excluding Roes transects) was only 317. Two Green Hairstreaks were seen this week, both on the east side of the New

Forest (Lepe & Fields Heath).

Please don't forget to record any moths you come across on transect. This week a Brown Silver-line was recorded at Godshill, as well as a few Common Heath on heathland transects.



Eleven different species were seen this week: Brimstone (108), Speckled Wood (72), Orange-tip (32), Peacock (31), Green-veined White (29), Small White (24), Large White (6), Holly Blue (6), Comma (5), Red Admiral (2) and Green Hairstreak (2).

The weather for the coming week looks to be much better so should be easier for those on the rota. For the third week running we are asking you to look out for Pearl-bordered Fritillary on the routes around Brockenhurst. These should really have emerged by now: the latest emergence in recent years in the New Forest is 7 May.

Moth to Spot: With the weather starting to improve, hopefully more moths will be seen on the wing in the coming week. Speckled Yellow (<a href="https://www.ukmoths.org.uk/species/pseudopanthera-macularia/">https://www.ukmoths.org.uk/species/pseudopanthera-macularia/</a>) should be appearing in woodland rides, while Common Heath (<a href="https://www.ukmoth-s.org.uk/species/ematurga-atomaria/">https://www.ukmoth-s.org.uk/species/ematurga-atomaria/</a>) have already been spotted. This week's focus is on The Cinnabar (<a href="https://www.ukmoths.org.uk/species/tyria-jacobaeae/">https://www.ukmoths.org.uk/species/tyria-jacobaeae/</a>), which may be spotted in any grassy open area, including woodland rides. Looking red and fluttery when in flight, its distinctive black wings with red markings are seen when it is at rest. This moth emerges throughout the late spring and early summer so may be seen through until August. Its distinctive orange and black caterpillars may also be spotted feeding on Ragwort.
