A total of 5,360 butterflies were recorded this week at a density of 45.49 butterflies/km, the lowest for Week 14 since 2016 (23.31) and more significantly a lower figure than Week 13. This could be an indication of an early peak this year which would be the earliest in our New Forest Group records (most annual peaks have been in Week 17).

Most significant this week is the first Grayling of the year, recorded on Broomy Plain transect. Silver-studded Blue have definitely passed their annual peak but Gatekeeper numbers are on the increase at last. Red Admiral were present on 22 of the 49 recorded routes.

The only species likely to be seen but not yet recorded on our transects this year are Purple Hairstreak and Clouded Yellow. Also only one Painted Lady has been seen so far.

Moth Report: Fewer moths overall were spotted last week, with many of the spring species having finished their flight periods. <u>Silver Y</u> were recorded again and may be seen over the rest of summer and autumn. <u>Narrow-bordered Five-spot Burnet</u> have also been seen and, based on previous years, the more common <u>Six-spot Burnet</u> should be on the wing soon and may be seen in good numbers in grassland areas and occasionally along woodland rides. Last week was also notable for some interesting one off sightings of moths, including a <u>Green Silver-lines</u>, so do keep a lookout to see what's around.
