There was a real drop in the total count this week, with only 55% of the numbers seen in Week 18. This is no doubt due to the extreme heat as, like us humans, insects avoid being out and about. We were surprised that we didn't have some zero counts, particularly on the heathland transects.

It was no surprise that Gatekeeper dominated once again making up 47% of the total numbers recorded. Grayling remain abundant, up over 12% on the Week 18 total. Last year Grayling peaked on transect in Week 17 with a total count of 141, so this seems to be a good year. If any new recorders have not seen one yet then this is a good time to seek them out on our heathland routes. For the second week running, Clouded Yellow were recorded at Breamore.

Moth Report: Many thanks to all those who have spotted moths in recent weeks. At this time of year, few are seen in high numbers but there are an interesting range being spotted. Six-spot Burnet are still being recorded on a few transects and there have also been sightings of the Common Purple and Gold, which is definitely at the lower end of our size range, and a Yellow Shell. If walking a heathland route, please keep an eye open for the Bordered Grey, which is easily disturbed during daytime and is about the size of a Grayling. The distinctive Jersey Tiger continues to be seen in gardens in the south of the New Forest but has yet to be spotted on transects and there is always the possibility that the delightful Humming-bird Hawkmoth may put in an appearance in this warm weather.
