New Forest Transect Group Newsletter 2020

A brighter week has resulted in more butterflies being recorded although some routes have once again experienced very low numbers. A total of 670 butterflies were seen (28% higher than Week 23) at a density of 5.54 butterflies/km (once again the lowest since 2014 for this week).

A total of 16 different species were recorded. Speckled Wood was the most abundant species as might be expected, followed by Small White and Large White, with all these three species being seen on over 30 transect routes. Grayling made a further appearance on four of the heathland transects.
