New Forest Transect Group Newsletter 2020

Week 25 saw higher species diversity than in Week 24. Total abundance for all transects was slightly down at 638 (of which over 50% were Speckled Wood), equating to a density of 5.27 butterflies per transect kilometre. The highest count of the week was at Mockbeggar (83), followed by Blashford North (61) and Blashford South (46).

Clouded Yellow, recorded on transect at Barton Common and at Mockbeggar, together with a Wall at Warren Farm, provided the highlights of the week. Broomy Plain and Claypits Bottom were the only two 'pure' heathland transects where butterflies were recorded.
